



Theme: "If I Mess Up, God Will Reject Me?"

Text: Luke 15:11-32

Study Questions

For Personal Reflection:

- 1. Have you ever wanted independence from authority, only to realize later that you needed guidance? How did that experience shape you?
- 2. What does this story teach us about the consequences of impulsive decisions? How can we apply that lesson in our daily lives?
- 3. Have you ever felt like the prodigal son—distant from God or others? What brought you back?
- 4. **Do you think the son was truly sorry, or was he just desperate?** How can we tell the difference between true repentance and regret?

For Relationship with God:

- 5. What does this parable tell us about God's character? How does it challenge the way we view God?
- 6. Why do you think the father welcomed the son so eagerly, even though he wasted everything? What does this say about God's grace?
- 7. What does it mean to 'come to your senses' like the prodigal son did (Luke 15:17)? What are some signs that you might need to return to God?

For Social and Peer Interactions:

- 8. Do you ever feel like the older brother, upset when someone who messed up gets forgiven easily? How does this reveal our own struggles with grace and fairness?
- 9. **How do we respond when a friend or family member makes mistakes?** Are we more like the father or the older brother in how we treat them?
- 10. If someone hurt you deeply and then apologized, how hard would it be for you to forgive them? What does this parable teach us about that?

For Life Choices:

- 11. What are some modern-day examples of a "prodigal son" lifestyle? Where do you see this in social media, school, or culture?
- 12. What might be a "distant country" in your own life—things that draw you away from God? How can you recognize when you're drifting?
- 13. Why do people often have to hit rock bottom before they turn back to God? How can we avoid reaching that point?
- 14. What are some ways we can remind ourselves of God's love, even when we feel unworthy?

Bonus Questions!!

- Why do you think the father ran to meet the son instead of waiting for him?
- How can we apply the lesson of the older brother to our own friendships?
- What are some modern distractions that act as a 'distant country' in our lives?
- Do you think the prodigal son truly changed, or was he just desperate?
